## SMV History Presents: Santa Maria during the Korean War

Camp Cooke, now our Vandenburg Space Force Base, was the West Coasts first armored and infantry training installation. It was built in 1941 and trained more than 400 military units during WWII. Camp Cooke was placed on inactive status in 1946. The property was leased for agriculture and grazing. In 1950, the camp reopened and was again used as an armored and infantry training site. In 1951, it would receive Korean War veterans in its 1,000-bed hospital with expansion to 1,750 beds. In August of 1950, Santa Maria had nine young men in active service: Army – Edwin Dalla Costa, Rudy Moreno, Joe Gallardo, Marine- Curtis Youngs Jr., Air Force – Frank Buono Jr., David Turek, Julein Martinez and Navy – Bill Watters and Eugene McCutcheon. In September of 1950, Joe Torres was our first casualty of the Koreon War. He was 20 years old. His brothers Jesse and Mike are members of the National Guard stationed at Camp Cooke. ## Pioneer Spotlight (Mid Century): William "Bill" Ellis Sr.

Although Bill was born in Oklahoma, he came to Santa Maria in 1931. He was in the Marine Corps during WW 2. Bill was also involved with the American Legion Post 56, International Odd Fellows No. 302, Encampment of Santa Maria No 31, the SM Senior Citizens Club, Boy Scouts and baseball. What he is mostly remembered for is his efforts to bring Little League Baseball to Santa Maria and his founding of Middle League Baseball. Through the efforts of Bill and his committee of Butch Simas, Larry Lavagnino Sr., Harry 'Rabbit' Goodchild and Carl Barbettini, they petitioned the Little League headquarters in 1949 for a



charter. They were successful and, in 1950, Santa Maria Little League was chartered to play. In April of 1950, over 300 boys, ages 8 – 12, came for tryouts. With sponsors and coaches, six teams, along with a reserve team, were formed. That first year, the top players were Don Gatewood, first baseman for Melby's, and Ralph McBride, pitcher for Orcutt 'Casey' Tigers. Middle League, was founded by Bill in 1951 when they noticed there was no place for 13 to 15-year-olds to play ball. At the same time, in

New Jersey, the Babe Ruth League was being formed to also include 13 to 15-year-old ball players using regulation size baselines. In 1952, the Santa Maria Middle League started playing ball near the Elk's field (entrance on McClelland) on a field measuring 75' (Little League fields are 50' and professional fields are 90' baselines). Bill donated not only his time, but also helped fund the Little and Middle Leagues. Ball fields needed to be built, equipment needed to be bought and sponsors needed to be secured. In 1967, the baseball field being built at Waller County Park was named Ellis Field in William "Bill" Ellis Sr.'s honor. For the record, in 1948 through the donations of the Santa Maria Elk's, Elk's field, home of the Santa Maria Indians (1944) semi-pro team, was named. In 1995. Southside Little League Field in Simas Park was dedicated.
